

## The year in short

**For the Cedar Foundation team**, 2021 was another year filled with uncertainties and challenges - for the spirit, and for the ability to be flexible, patient, and focused on our goals. A year in which, after the initial chaos of the COVID-19 virus, the world gradually established a new rhythm, while we at Cedar welcomed new challenges and conquered new summits.

**In moments of big change**, vulnerable groups face even bigger difficulties and have greater need of our support. This is why in 2021, our team's aspiration was to gather our strength after the abrupt changes and to provide the children and young adults in our centres the chance to adapt to the new setting and rhythm of work in a calmer, more stable environment. We tried to pay attention to personal care, healthy habits, and time outdoors.

**During the year, we signed** new 5-year contracts to manage our social services in Kyustendil - family-type centres for disabled children and adults, and a day care support centre for disabled young adults and their families. We are proud to continue being the leading organisation in residential care for disabled people and we have witnessed the children growing up in a stable, healthy environment.

**Unfortunately, the unstable political situation** in Bulgaria pushed the subject of social services and child care to the background, and the matter of developing new laws and regulations for the Social Services Act has remained open.

**This year again** we had to limit our meetings with donors and chose the remote initiatives and online campaigns for fundraising. We steered our efforts towards digital communication and optimization of donation possibilities through technological solutions. We renewed our logo and focused on the most sustainable sources for funding in an environment deprived of personal contact - regular donation programs and crowdfunding platforms. We communicated our messages mainly through social media and newsletters.

**It was a dynamic year**, but one filled with lessons as well. It taught us to be patient and humble and to enjoy all wins - small or big.

**Together with you - our partners and friends** - we change the future of the disadvantaged people in Bulgaria. Thank you for your support!

# Our social services in 2021

Despite the continuing epidemic situation in the country, during 2021 we made serious progress with the physical, intellectual, and psychological development of the children and young adults in our family-type centres. The main priority throughout the year was the protection of their health, but our field specialists worked actively towards engaging and including all of them in the various activities, which were planned in therapy programs, and individual or group interest-based projects.

In September 2021, we signed a contract and in the next 5 years we will continue to manage our family-type centres: “Siyanie”, which includes 4 separate houses and the “Sineva” centre for social rehabilitation, and integration.

We were successfully licensed by the Agency for Quality of Social Services in the following services:

**Family-type residential centres** with licences for: “Residential care for children at risk”; “Residential care for disabled children and young adults”; “Residential care for adults”.

**Social rehabilitation and integration centre** with licences for: “Support for acquisition of labour skills”; “Information and consultation”; “Advocacy and mediation”; “Therapy and rehabilitation”; “Training in skills acquisition”.

## Kazanlak

Our family-type centre for children at risk provided a sustainable growth environment for our young adults. All children and young adults went to school regularly and successfully completed the 2020/2021 school year. One of our young adults had an excellent performance at a competition for “Best mechanical engineering technician” organised by his high school. He was chosen to participate in the Erasmus+ “Drip energy model” project and in the spring he went on a two-week visit to Germany for practical education. In August, another one of the young adults, who studies hairdressing, participated in a project from this program and visited Portugal. For two weeks, along with the rest of the selected participants, he had the opportunity to visit hair dye factories, to learn new hair-colouring techniques, to meet peers from different countries, and to develop his social and professional skills.

Five young adults celebrated their high school graduation with a prom, which brought them a lot of emotions and hopes for the future. The following vacation was an active period for those who were preparing to continue their education, as well as for those who were going through preparations for leaving our family-type centre. After a lot of a hard work and active support from our side, three of the young adults were accepted to continue their education in universities - The Plovdiv Branch of Sofia Technical University, Trakia University Stara Zagora, and the Saints Cyril and Methodius Orthodox Theological Academy in Plovdiv.





In our mentorship program for young adults who are preparing for an independent life, we discussed the subjects of professional orientation, budget planning, free time management, etc. The young adults who had graduated high school, supported by our field team, left the family-type centres and took their own path. Some of the youths who left the program continue to receive our support on their path of independence remotely, through mentorship and guidance for dealing with professional and personal matters.

Employment support is one of the main tasks in the care of grown-up children. We conducted activities to introduce ways to look for a job, the preparation of application documents, workplace etiquette, and the development of work habits. In the past year, two of the young adults started working with contracts. And, with our assistance, one of our most persevering youths was included in an OMV Bulgaria scholarship program and as a part of it, he now works part-time.

Apart from preparation and training, the children and young adults had the opportunity to have some fun throughout the year. They participated in a body art workshop “Live Pictures from the Valley”, part of the Valley of the Thracian Rulers holidays. Through ancient Thracian pictures, the children and young adults had the opportunity to feel the spirit of the ancient thracians. And in September, they enjoyed a three-day rest at Vila Diana, at Buzludzha, getting in touch with nature and fresh air. Two of the young adults were baptised in the “Uspenie Bogorodichno” Church in Kazanlak.

In March 2021, a new child was accommodated at the family-type centre for children at risk. Our social therapists worked hard on their adaptation and inclusion in the youth community and the way of life at the social service.

In the past year, one of our young girls discovered her new family. She was adopted and moved to America.

Throughout the past year our field teams conducted various activities with the children and young adults. The purpose of the activities was to develop their overall skills, fine motor skills and concentration, but also to educate, entertain and calm them. A lot of the children and young adults acquired new skills and have honed the old ones, they have mastered new syllables and words, improved their communication skills, expression, motor skills, etc. All children, who are part of the education system, participated in online activities, depending on their health. We focused on indoor and outdoor physical activities - gymnastics and regular exercise, jumping on a trampoline, competitive games, etc. There were regular pottery, felting and crafting activities. Based on their individual needs and plans, each child received regular kinesitherapy, occupational and art therapy, music therapy, rhythm therapy and sensory stimulation.

One of the youths successfully graduated from evening high school. He completed a cooking class and he made one of his dreams come true - to practise what he learned, in real life, and he started working with an employment contract. We supported him throughout the entire process of training and employment and he is doing well, communicating successfully with his employer and colleagues, striving to gain new skills, being diligent and responsible.



## Kyustendil

Throughout the 11 years of management of the family-type centres in Kyustendil, the team has displayed a sustainable model of management of the service, where the disabled children and young adults lead a dignified life and are socially active.

In 2021 we observed progress in the development of each and every one of the young people in our family centres in Kyustendil. We actively involve everyone in the daily activities in the houses and the yard. The young adults participate in maintaining the yard space and willingly look after the flowers and fruit trees there, as well as the greenhouses and herb flowerbeds. They cultivate and harvest the tomatoes, cucumbers, green beans, and courgettes with pleasure; they look after the animals by giving them food and maintaining hygiene at the animal area. We conduct occupational therapy and art therapy daily, as a group and individually, crafting various decorative items, working on improving the children and young adults' fine motor skills, sensory integration, communication in a group, etc.

Due to the pandemic, the young adults haven't participated in part-time services in the community, however we provide educational support at the family centres. Our therapists focus their support on improving the literacy and socialisation of the youths. Interest-based clubs are favoured by most children and young adults - they join them with great interest and are always looking forward to the activities. Throughout the year we've had activities in the following areas: Ladies Club, Tourism, Dancing, Cooking, and Library of Toys.

During the summer we organised a holiday at the mountains and by the sea - at the Osogovo Mountain and around Burgas. The vacations charged the young adults with a lot of pleasant emotions, enriching their knowledge and contributing to their emotional stability.

Respecting all anti epidemic measures, our team did not let even one user get sick with COVID-19. Despite the fact that the majority of the team is vaccinated, there were sick colleagues a few times throughout the year and we had to quarantine the centres. Regardless of this, the daily care and support of the youths continues to happen according to plan.

## Work with intellectually challenged young adults and their families at the Social Rehabilitation and Integration Centre

The therapies and rehabilitations that were developed and introduced at the SRIC were kept throughout 2021 as well. We adapted some of the activities and methods according to the emergency situation. As a result of the daily intensive work with all the youths, we achieved the majority of their individual plans and goals connected to the functional and recreational occupational therapy, art therapy, and educational needs.

The young adults gained experience in the remote working model. Throughout the year, they improved their work with different online applications like Viber and Messenger, which made them flexible in working with useful information. Also, it taught them to take photographs and send

assignments through the applications, as well as to organise activities with the specialists. Some of the youths participated in projects for temporary employment and others gained an additional professional qualification in the professions “Economist”, “Office assistant”, and “Worker in the food industry”. The youths participated in a number of community activities and town holidays, visiting museums, art galleries, libraries, arts and crafts workshops, and coffee shops. During the summer, they participated in four planned excursions, which diversified their daily lives and brought them a lot of positive emotions.

During this year we continued working on the “Beautiful yard and garden” project with a lot of art and occupational activities from the functional occupational therapy. The youths learned to plaster and paint walls, and they painted the walls of the service yard. We decided to do direct group and individual work mainly in open spaces. But we also included a lot of new activities with demonstrations and the learning of new art techniques like candle making, soap making, string art, wool paintings, and applications with natural materials.

The youths from the “The stage is mine” club participated in the recording of a short video about Kyustendil. We combined an opportunity to get to know your country with a planned excursion. The short video reflected the natural and architectural landmarks of the town and the young adults really enjoyed participating in the project. We purposefully worked towards a weekly inclusion of the families of the young adults when it comes to decision-making and preparing their individual goals, activities, and interests.

Throughout different periods of the year, the centre had to work exclusively in a digital environment, with remote access to the users and their families through various apps. We provided the youths with homework tasks and we planned various activities, applicable to the remote model of work. Despite the complicated epidemic situation, not a single young adult stopped using the centre. Another young adult from the community began to visit our centre and his family shared that they can see the result from our work with him. Our specialists also became more confident and experienced in the remote model of work, which guarantees quality support for our users and their families.

# Stories from our work

## For the first time

To Hristo,\* 2021 was a year of new beginnings. He had a lot of “firsts” and each one gave him confidence, experience, and filled him with newfound curiosity about his own life.

He successfully graduated high school and travelled outside Bulgaria for the first time. He applied and was accepted at a university in a nearby city. He also started living alone for the first time in his life.

Our colleagues from the foundation's family centre supported him in each of these endeavours. And with the help of Hristo's donor from the “Sponsor a child” program, in April we were able to send him to a learning exchange experience in Germany. The trip to Berlin, Dresden, and Leipzig broadened his mindset, German accuracy impressed him, and the newly gained knowledge of German automobile mechanics pointed him towards choosing an engineering major at university.

After an exciting celebration for his high school graduation, Hristo dedicated his summer to preparations for his university application process. As a result, he was accepted in his chosen major at the Technical University in Plovdiv.

Alongside with his studies, Hristo began working a part-time job on a scholarship program, which will provide him with financial stability and will help build his work skills. Very soon, Hristo will go on his own way and his successes will inspire us to continue to help and support the children who need it.




## Fresh vegetables, fragrant herbs, fresh air

At our centres this year, a new therapeutic activity was started - an activity, combining occupational therapy, sensory stimulation, and teamwork. The restrictions imposed by the pandemic gave us the opportunity to focus our efforts on the yard, and specifically the garden, where we found pleasant emotions and we raised organic home-made products.

Harvesting develops work habits. Being in touch with soil and plants awakens the senses and brings one down to Earth, but the biggest prize for the gardener is undoubtedly the satisfaction and pride of the job done.

The labour market in Bulgaria is still very limited for people with disabilities and provides little or no opportunities. This is why throughout the past year our teams spent a long time outdoors and together with the youths they cultivated marvellous gardens with courgettes, beans, strawberries, tomatoes, and herbs.

It's a moment of great excitement when they get to show the flowerbeds to guests, laughing and proudly pointing at the still green, but quite large tomatoes. All summer we enjoyed fresh salads and dishes with home-made products and we have set even more ambitious goals for next year. We can't

## Beyond limits

Stefcho is 24 years old. Kind, responsive, and smiling, he came to our protected home in Kazanlak after leaving a Home for children with mental issues, where he lived until adulthood. During the first months of his stay, Stefcho already displayed interest towards cooking in the house and soon he started helping.

Stefcho likes to be busy and wants to learn new things. He quickly learned to read and write, graduated high school, and did several courses for additional qualifications - for a masseur and a builder. He also participated in a volunteer project to help the elderly. But most of all, he is interested in cuisine and one day his fortune smiled on him - he was offered an internship at a catering company. The internship passed by so quickly and he did a wonderful job - he became a favourite of the team at the small family company. His happiness was immense when immediately after the internship, he was offered a permanent job. Now Stefcho works on an employment contract and he would even work on the weekends if they would let him. His colleagues accept him as a part of the family and are inspired by his positivism and desire to grow. Not only does he want to get better at his job, but he also dreams of having a family and a child to look after and educate one day. When he is facing difficulties, he doesn't give up, but he moves on "bravely onward, with his head up high".

Stefcho is an example of how a person, who grew up in an institution, stigmatised, and rejected, can integrate with society and lead a good, dignified life, if he is provided with the opportunity and a safe space to explore his potential. We are proud of his achievements and we hope that there will be other young adults like him, who will get a chance to make their dreams come true.



## Trainings for the field teams

It is important for us to increase the qualifications of the specialists in our centres. This is why in 2021, we included some of them in seminars and training to help them in their day-to-day work. Here are some of the more significant trainings we had throughout the year:

“Managing social services for children and adults. Practical work on basic documents administration”, Trainer: “Training Factory”;

“Therapy in social services. Occupational therapy, art therapy, music therapy, psychotherapy”, provided by “Training Factory”;

“Violence prevention in social services. Personnel being violent towards the social service users. Methods of coping. “, organised by the National Alliance for Social Responsibility;

“First aid at the workplace”, Trainer: BRC.

“Model for developing work skills in people with intellectual disabilities”;

# Donation campaigns and events

The charity situation in Bulgaria has been very dynamic during the last few years. We have observed increased interest towards volunteering, various causes and civil organisations, and corporate policies for social responsibility, specifically employee engagement, have become more and more prioritised by large companies. Organisations like BCause and Volontime help causes become more recognisable and accessible, connecting the private sector to non-government organisations and developing good practices like payroll giving and crowdfunding.

Corporate committees for social responsibility have reached out to us more often, requesting events or experiences with added value. During the past year we partnered with different companies who wanted to connect their team building initiatives with our work and the support we provide to children and young adults from vulnerable groups. We had two initiatives with the employees of different companies (Legion Run, Atos corporate online quiz), which gave us the opportunity to attract new donors and followers.

We worked towards increasing our regular donors by developing new opportunities for monthly support related to our healthcare programs (the “Care for me” program).

We had several online donation campaigns (Platformata.bg) and various initiatives for marketing with a cause (Dabov Specialty Coffee, Salad box, Pizza Lab).

Here are some highlights from our fundraising activities:

## For the Children! Go! – Legion Run sport event

One of the most emotional and adrenaline-filled fundraising events in 2021 was the charity participation of celebrities and various company employees in Legion Run. Fear, excitement, sweat, and mud were excellently mixed with our effort to be mentors and to give the children under our care a good example of how to overcome difficulties, how to work as a team, and learn what are the most valuable qualities which make one an independent, successful, and happy person. The initiative introduced us to new partners and the celebrities' enthusiasm - Alexander Alexiev (quoted in the title), Stoyan Doychev, Yana Marinova, and the gymnast Hristiyana Todorova, who led the special Cedar Legion, was infectious for the participants on the field, as well for our team, who set a goal of being more than just an observer next year.



## “Cook With Me” campaign

“Cook With Me” is an initiative which provides the means for one of our most delicious therapy programs - culinary workshops for disabled young adults. Each year our field specialists prepare a number of cooking activities where they introduce the youths to various products and preparation techniques. It's difficult to seal the results, as they don't last long, but we are proud to share that a skilled baker lives in one of our Kyustendil centres - she always makes sure that we welcome our guests with freshly baked bread. Another one of the youths strictly monitors the diversity of the daily menu.



## “Superhero Challenge” campaign

The superhero challenge is not new to us. It began in 2015, when our team climbed the highest Bulgarian peak, Musala, dressed in superhero costumes, as a sign of gratitude to our donors. In 2021 we attacked another Bulgarian high peak - Botev. We did not dress as superheroes this time, but we still wore costumes - ones that represented our personal best qualities - cheerfulness, creativity, kindness, and resourcefulness. We wanted to show our gratitude to the heroes, who raise and look after the children and young adults at the foundation's centres, and also to raise funds for the yearly summer vacations at the seaside and the mountains. We found out that the road up is long and sometimes one might need a safety rope, but with patience and teamwork, every peak is achievable. The raised funds provided a summer camp for 15 young adults from our Kyustendil centres. (a photo from the vacation + ours from climbing the peak)




## Annual charity ball

The planning of the event was filled with unknown factors and we did not know what to expect until the very last moment. Despite the uncertainty, we still managed to meet some of our long-term donors and a few new companies in person, and together we celebrated the successes of our youths and we listened to some good music.

We introduced a new fundraising mechanism - a silent auction, where through photographs of successful Bulgarian artists, we managed to share stories from the daily lives of our children and teams.

We are grateful to the companies and organisations who stood behind our event for yet another year and continue to make sustainable care for disadvantaged people possible.





## Products with a cause

Products with a cause is a popular practice of many civil organisations, and is a good way to make your mission visible to a wider audience. In 2021, with the help of one of our designer partners, Karina Talpova, we suggested several models of tote bags and tritan water bottles, with which we sent a message and we shared our views of child happiness and care for the vulnerable people in general.




## Thank you Mark!
